Report on Project Status to Joint Commission Subcommittee September 2, 2004

Now, WSDOT and ODOT management and the joint project team will brief the Subcommittee on significant progress made since that time – in work activities, contractual milestones, and technical work products.

WHERE WE'VE BEEN...

2001-2002

What are the origins of the Columbia River Crossing Project? The 2001-2002 *I-5 Transportation and Trade Partnership* brought together the region's interests, who developed a shared vision for the Columbia River Crossing corridor. Within the recommendations of the Partnership Task Force, multiple concepts emerged for further study. Key components – freeway, transit, commuter rail, finance, and environmental justice – fit within the framework of the today's joint ODOT/WSDOT Columbia River Crossing Project. Other recommended components fall to other regional entities for next steps, including freight rail, to be addressed through a Bi-State Rail Forum, and land use, the jurisdiction of the MPOs. 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WHAT'S DRIVING THIS PROJECT? (like a "Did you know" box)

- The I-5 Interstate Bridge across the Columbia is actually two bridges side-by-side, built in 1917 and 1958. They work today, in combination with the I-205 Columbia River Bridge, but what about tomorrow?
- A world-class economy in the Vancouver/Portland region needs world-class infrastructure. Business continually cites freight and commuter congestion and safety as top regional issues.
- Two states are involved, but the issues are shared. Strong commitment exists from both sides of the river to move ahead with improvements in the Columbia River Crossing area.

JOINT PROJECT TEAM CHARTERED

Since the last Joint Commission Subcommittee meeting, the WSDOT/ODOT project team has(<u>The MOU defines the Project Team as Conrad, Rosenbereger, Garrett, Wagner,</u> <u>DeGraff and Himes)</u>:

- Framed joint team management -- named project co-directors and co-located them.
- Agreed on how to work together -- developed ODOT/WSDOT project team MOU and draft charter for advisory task force.
- Reached out as a bi-state team to regional partners, including FHWA, FTA, MPOs, Bi-State Coordination Committee, Regional Coordinating Committee, transit agencies<u>(the DOTs "reached out " to everyone on this list except FHWA</u> and FTA well before the meeting in May – the <u>Project Directors have been</u> meeting jointly with individual regional partners, business groups etc since I was brought on in June
- Met contracting milestones to engage needed talents. Now under contract are:
 - Larkin Group, with Siegel and Underhill Intergovernmental Coordination and Regulatory Issues <u>(Larkin is doing all the big picture</u> <u>thinking about scoping, and getting organized for the EIS – don't know</u> <u>how to describe that in English)</u>
 - David Evans and Associates, with Parisi and Vollmer Traffic and Tolling
 - Kittelson Associates, with PB, CH2MHill, ROW, Howell, and JD White Conceptual Engineering and Environmental
 - HNTB, to EnviroIssues, with JD White, Markgraf, and Northwest Strategies Communications and Outreach

MAKING PROGRESS ON TECHNICAL WORK PRODUCTS

- <u>TM 8.1 Analysis of Issues Affecting Columbia River Crossing Options caused</u> <u>by Federal Tolling Statutes</u> *Status*: First draft circulated for review.
- <u>TM 8.6.1 Analysis of State of Oregon Tolling Statutes</u> *Status*: First draft circulated for review.
- <u>TM 4.3, on Traffic and Travel Characteristics and Trends</u> *Status:* Circulated for review and finalized.
