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00023 1 bridge. This not only slaps of arrogance, 2 but it also shows their lack of ability to 3 critically think through solutions to 4 problems. They cannot grasp the slapping 5 of a variable toll during peak hours. I just want you all to understand 7 that they refuse to realize that it's 8 their problem on the Oregon side with the 9 bottleneck, not Washington's. 10 Thank you very much. 11 HAL DENGERINK: Thank you, Kim. 12 Jim? 13 JIM KARLOCK: Hello. My name is 14 Jim Karlock. I live at 3311 Northeast 15 35th in Portland, Oregon. 16 I brought with me my copy of the 17 draft EIS statement. This is actually 18 without the appendix. It's also without 19 the technical supplements. There's what I 20 managed to print so far. The ream of 21 paper at the bottom is for the stuff I 22 haven't yet printed. 23 So how many of you people at the 24 table here have gone through this whole 25 5000 to 6000 pages of information?

I mean, you've got 45 days to do it. That's only 100 pages a day. Anybody ought to be able to sop up 100 pages of this stuff a day. I suggest that 45 days is he woefully inadequate.

Moving on. Here's a little surprise I found in -- someplace in this file. There's a picture of this thing over Hayden Island. Gee, you notice a shadow here? Well, that's because this stuff is elevated above ground.

Sharing it with one of the people a few minutes ago -- one of the engineers, it's apparently 30 feet above ground the entire length of the island. Nice price for the Islanders.

Just to get some perspective, the new bridge is going to -- the deck of the new bridge is going to be at the height of the tallest part of the current bridge excepting the towers.

So you want to see this individually? Just sight along the top of the bridge. That is where the new bridge will be.

view from the marina. Okay. Got more to do here.

Now I took a look at the cost of the light rail option. Apparently they expect 7350 people during the evening four-hour rush hour if they build the delux bridge. No build will be 2000 people, so you get about 5300 people that will be attracted to transit by spending one-point -- excuse me -- by spending eleven-hundred-million-dollars for 5000 people. That works out to 200,000 dollars for every person you attract to transit by spending eleven-hundred-million on light

Well, that 200,000 dollars per person that you somehow hopefully attracted out of their car -- you can invest that at three percent a year and get 6000 dollars a year. About every five years, you can buy every one of those 5000 people a brand new car -- you know, like a Prius that uses a whole lot less energy than light rail because light rail certainly doesn't safe energy. It certainly does not save

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money. It is one of the most expensive transit options out there. The only thing light rail is good at is bringing in campaign donations to politicians that favor light rail.
