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should coordinate water quality monitoring and erosion control in coordination with Ecology's efforts currently underway.

Parameters should be expanded to include all of those listed in the study with Ecology. There are no long-term impacts listed that are in 3.19.9 that talk about the possibility of long-term subsidies of the public for maintenance and operations of light rail. And I personally can't afford to pay more taxes on that.

Finally, the draft list census data for the Metropolitan area as a whole -- this is insufficient. Every neighborhood that this project goes through is an environmental justice community and it requires different data than a group data set.

I moved over here five years ago to escape the Portland Government and taxes and such, and I am in opposition to the light rail coming over here.

I think the line ought to be drawn at the river because I do fear the crime that Portland is experiencing with the system as well as the increased taxes. This will give Portland Government and Tri-Met a toehold and I fear that it would just expand from that beginning.

As far as a toll on the bridge, I am in opposition to that because that puts a punishment tax on the Clark County commuters. They will carry the brunt of that toll.

It will cause -- as far as the disincentive to take the I-5 bridge that that toll was intended to be will cause people to go over to 205 and put a greater burden there and then maybe come back on 84, which is already pretty heavy traffic, plus the additional fuel that everybody will use to make that wide berth.

So I guess that's -- well, I am also
